**A 380 Million Year Old Tree Grows in New York**

Tucked away in the Upstate New York town of Gilboa, in Schoharie County, lies an amazing "forest" of fossilized trees (not petrified), that is amazing paleontologists, scientists, and fossil enthusiasts alike. Along the side of NY State Route 990V, near the Schoharie Reservoir Dam, is a display of some of the most unusual fossils ever unearthed in New York, or anywhere else.

In 1850, a local preacher named Samuel Lockwood discovered some very unusual rock formations in the streambed of the Schoharie Creek, after a flood event. In the 1920's, during the construction of the dam, a nearby quarry revealed more of these unusual fossils. Then, in 2004, during a rehabilitation of the dam, additional fossils were again uncovered! What were these strange formations?

It ends up they were the remains of an ancient forest of ARCHAETERIS trees, dating back to the Devonian period, 360-400 million years ago. The identifying piece of the puzzle was discovered in 2004, when the "crown" of the tree was found in the streambed at the dam site, confirming what scientists had thought. The town of Gilboa set up the fossil display along the road, with an informative kiosk explaining the fossils, several years ago. Upon the 2004 discovery, the town built a fossil museum around the corner, to tie in the entire story of the fossils.

If you happen to be travelling in this area of NY State, it is definitely worth a visit.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Jeff Wilson, on Thursday, May 14, 2015.

There was a cursory review of recent gem and mineral shows. The annual NY-NJ Metro Show, on April 10-12, 2015, had a preponderance of fossil, bead and jewelry vendors. Fortunately, the unique dinosaur replicas were installed, to add a bit of frivolity. Rockhounds could sift through the variety of specimens.

The Franklin NJ-NJESA Annual Show and Swap, on April 25-26, 2015, included an outstanding fluorescent section, pleasant conditions for the outside vendors and the pricier booths for some inside vendors.

Arlene Castleman, the treasurer, stated that the club's account is financially healthy.

The drawing for a 13 ½ lb. meteorite, donated by Derrick Yost, is a new feature. It is possible to purchase raffle tickets throughout the remainder of the year. Ultimately, this will culminate with a winner, at the holiday party. Some very lucky person is going to be the recipient of an unusual, extravagant rarity.

Dave Shapiro, the field trip captain, reported on the May 9, 2015 experience at the Martin Limestone/Kurtz Quarry. Collecting was scarce but the interesting geology and camaraderie compensated. He reminded the attendees that the next day, May 15, 2015, would be the

trip to the Inversand property, in Mantua, NJ, to look for fossils.

The anticipated Mineral Madness ritual did take place.

The club was lucky to have Steve Okulewicz as a speaker, once again. He is a professor of Geology, at Hofstra University, and his credentials include certification and licensing as a professional geologist. He has been the author of more than 45 geological publications, three geology books and various training manuals for the US Environmental Protection Agency.

The presentation was titled "Earthquakes and Fault Zones of NY/NJ/PA." Earthquakes create seismic waves that are caused by the sudden release of energy in the earth's crust. Rupturing of geological faults is the primary cause of earthquakes followed by other events such as volcanic activity, landslides, mine blasts and nuclear tests. Lots of information was accompanied by diagrams, charts and touches of humor. It was an enjoyable combination to have the sharing of knowledge with such a personable delivery.
