“11-year-old's Minerals on Exhibit At Museum”

Paterson - Gregory Zack is only 11 years old, but he is already a double winner. Gregory received a prize at the Youth Week Contest, conducted by the Paterson Museum, and now his exhibit of minerals has opened at the same institution.

The boy's minerals are on display in a special case in Mineral Hall, where qualified boys and girls of the area take turns exhibiting their rocks, minerals, and fossils.

Gregory is a 6th grader at School 15. He began visiting the museum last April. In his winning essay, Gregory said that when he first visited the museum, he knew very little about minerals, but the pretty colors and crystal shapes interested him. After his visit, he got busy with hunting down specimens, even inspiring his family to go on field trips to different locations to collect on weekends, and during summer break.

The family joined the Paterson Geological Club, located at the Museum, and attended additional trips, programs and rock swaps, where he acquired additional material. Gregory has included in his display beautiful minerals from Paterson which he collected himself and traded with other collectors. There are also minerals that he collected from Franklin. He also received several nice mineral specimens from far away, as birthday gifts from his parents and fellow club members. These are also on display.

The boy has become an expert in identifying minerals and won the first prize in a contest on Mineral Identification conducted by the Geological Club. Much of his knowledge has been acquired by reading and studying books on Rocks and Minerals, many given to him by his science teacher. The young man is now considering geology as a profession.

The Travertine of Ilion Gorge, Ilion, NY

Ilion, NY (ilion) is a small town in Central New York, 7 miles from Herkimer, that contains an interesting formation that is unique to this spot, and is unusual in mineral collecting circles. The formation lies in Ilion Gorge, a natural ravine, a few miles south of the village just off of Rt. 51.

Several years ago, Herkimer County decided that the annual flooding events along County Rt. 16 was not worth the cost and effort of keeping the road open through the gorge, and a one mile stretch of the road was permanently closed. Since then, the remnants of the road have slowly washed out, and the last remnants of the original road are now just a paved footpath through the woods. In some places, there is nothing left at all, the brook claiming every last chunk of asphalt.

About halfway along this section of road are a series of natural springs exiting the shale that is exposed in the gully. These springs are partially filled and coated in a bright orange to yellow to brown calcite travertine. Quite often, this travertine contains nice botryoidal crystals. This material has become a favorite of local collectors, but is relatively unknown outside of Central New York. Local Club field trip reports say this location never disappoints. In addition to the highly desired rounded crystals, there is also highly banded colorful flowstone that takes an attractive polish, and can also be

successfully slabbed. Rarely one can also find stalactites of this attractive material as well.

A very unique feature of this area is the formation of moss due to the high humidity and constant water flow. Over the years, some of the moss has become calcified due to being constantly exposed to the water coming from the mineral rich springs. This delicate material is a neat addition to any collection, and shows the unique and interesting dynamic interplay between biology and geology.

At the gorge, the travertine is forming because the ridges above the gorge are capped with limestone. As acid rain dissolves the limestone, the calcium carbonate rich water percolates through fractures in the shale. As the gorge cuts through the underlying shale, fractures in the shale create springs that contain the calcite travertine.

This is an interesting locality for collecting, and since it is considered a public road, there are no restrictions on access, or collecting.

Attached are 2 photos, one showing the bright orange calcite travertine, the second showing the calcified moss.
