Trilobite Ridge Revisited...Again

As the weather is getting cooler, I have been going on a few exploratory trips around my area, looking for new spots to collect minerals & fossils. So, last weekend, I ended up hiking along Trilobite Ridge for the first time since spring. I stopped in and spoke to the landowner, Leon Smith, and he told me that there have actually been a few small groups that have approached him about collecting the ridge this past summer. He allowed them in. One group was from Monmouth University, and another was from Rutgers. He also said that numerous individual collectors have stopped by. He never refuses a fossil collector access to the ridge, as long as they stop and ask.

Needless to say, with all this collecting activity, I expected to find a mess up there. Well, to my surprise, other than a huge amount of broken fossil rock along the path, the woods looked untouched. I was very appreciative to the collectors for not littering or causing harm to those pristine woods.

Of course, I managed to collect some nice specimens, before the afternoon mosquito hatch sent me packing. I slowly traversed the ridgeline, looking at all the piles of split open limestone from the previous collectors. I found the most productive area this day, to be about 1/2 mile out along the ridge from Mr. Smith's house. This is about the same area where Jess Jacobsen and others on the last club field trip, found some great coral fossils. I found a large rock sticking up out of the ground, and when I split it, it contained numerous Trilobite fossils, along with several brachiopods and crinoids, all preserved in a coarse grained blue limestone. It was definitely worth the long walk in. Just before I hopped on my ATV to head home, I investigated an uprooted tree just off the path near the house, and found another rock containing some weathered out shell fossils, and a couple Trilo's. Also, upon investigating the piles of split rock along the path, I discovered a few worthy specimens, that the previous collectors left behind. To say that my collecting bag was bursting at the seams is an understatement.

It was a nice trip back up to the ridgeline, and I will definitely be returning once the chill of fall sets in for good!

As a reminder to all NoJMS members, though we can not provide a club sponsored trip to this location, you can collect this location, with the OK of Mr. Smith. For info, directions, etc. just contact me. I may even be able to give guided tours if I'm available!

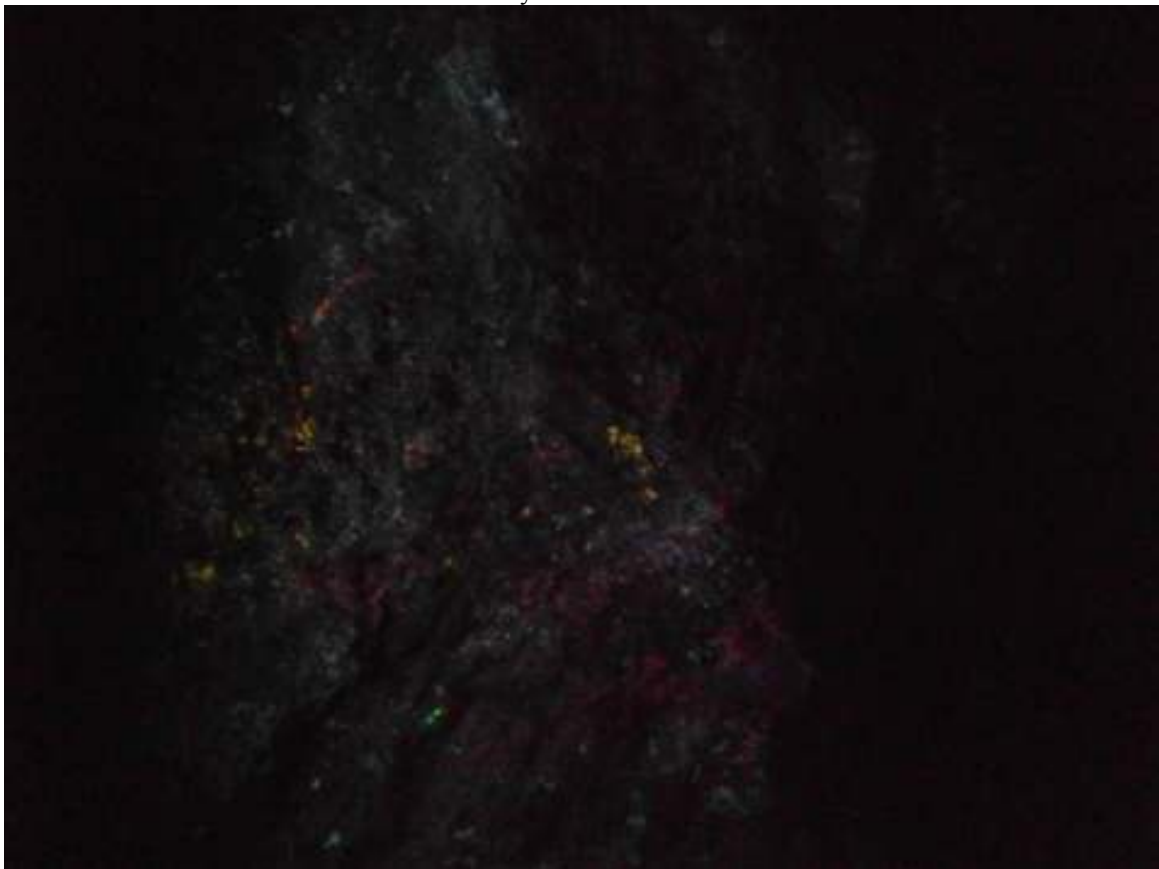

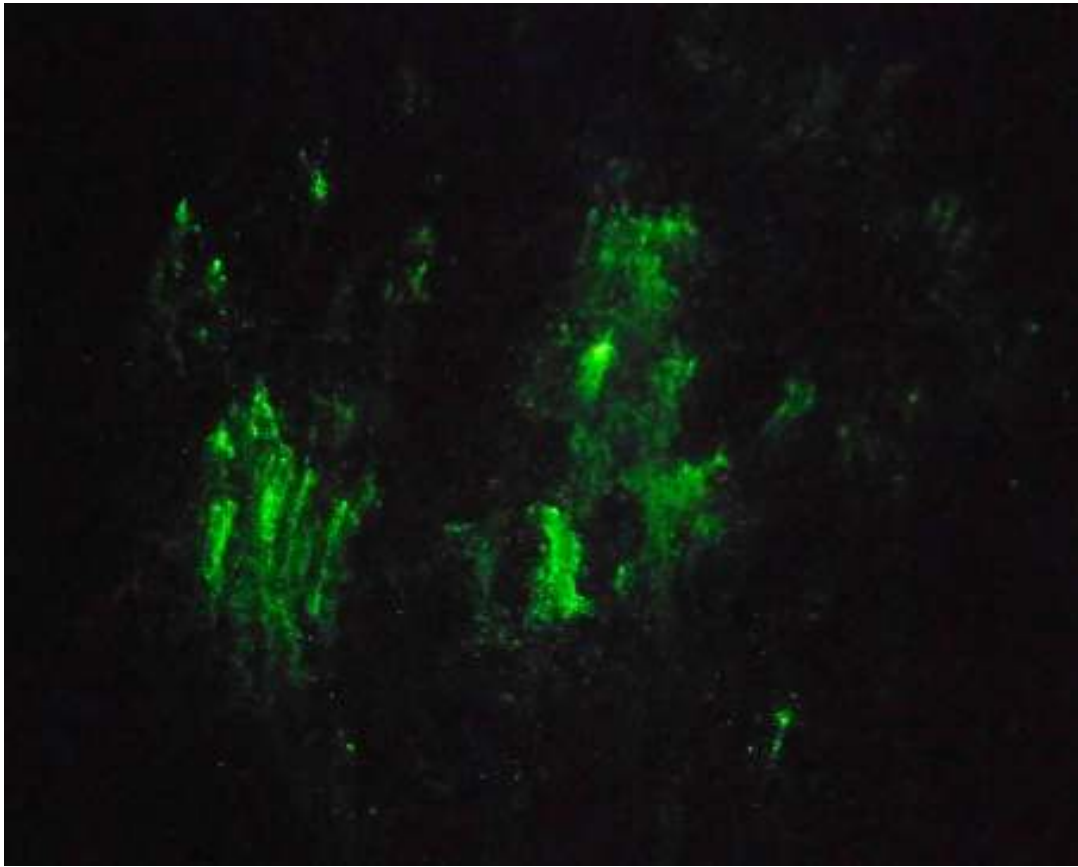

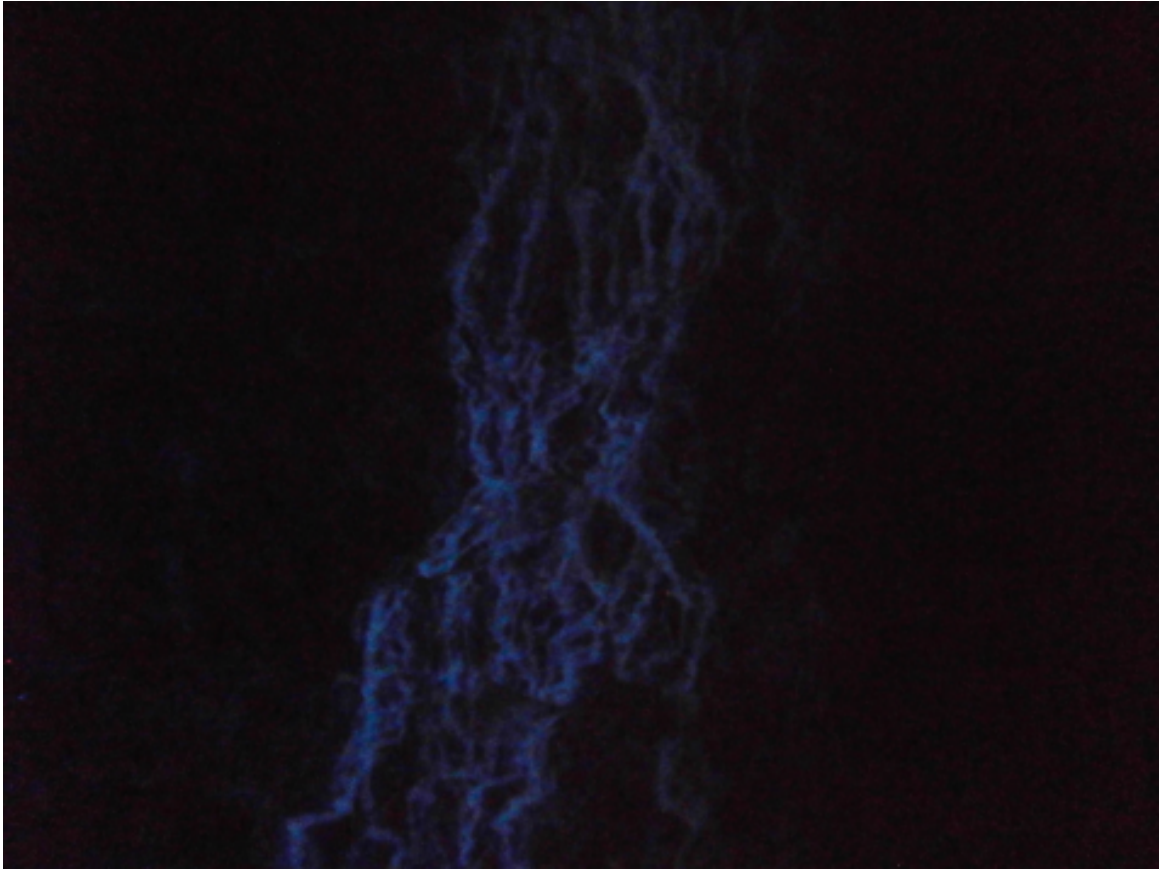

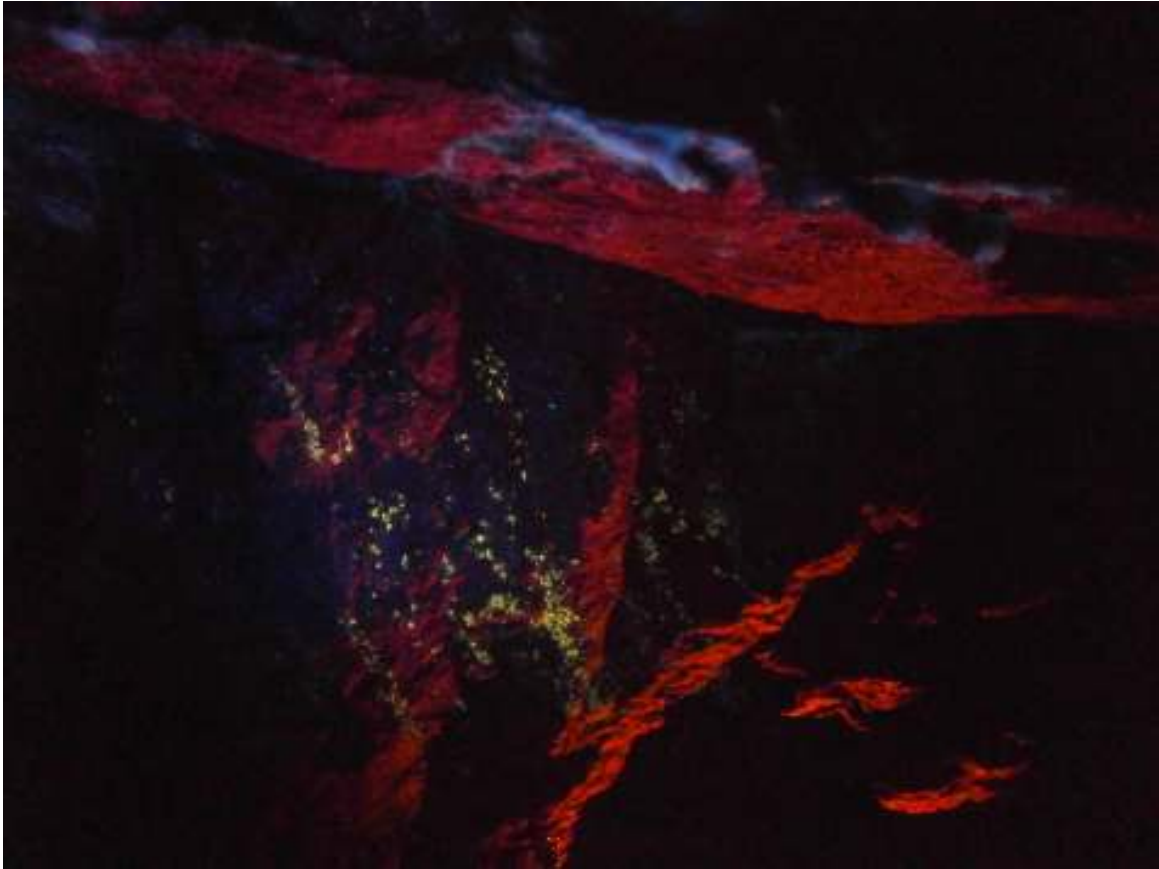

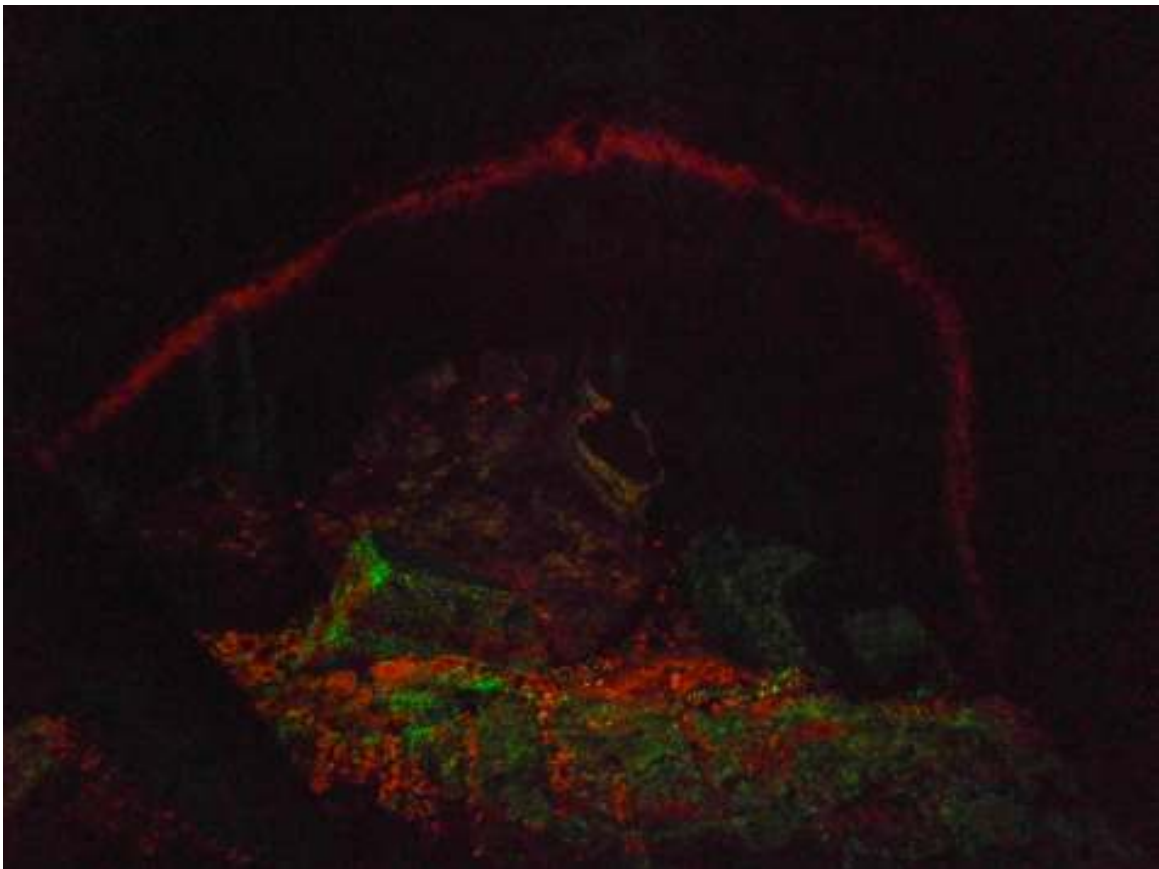

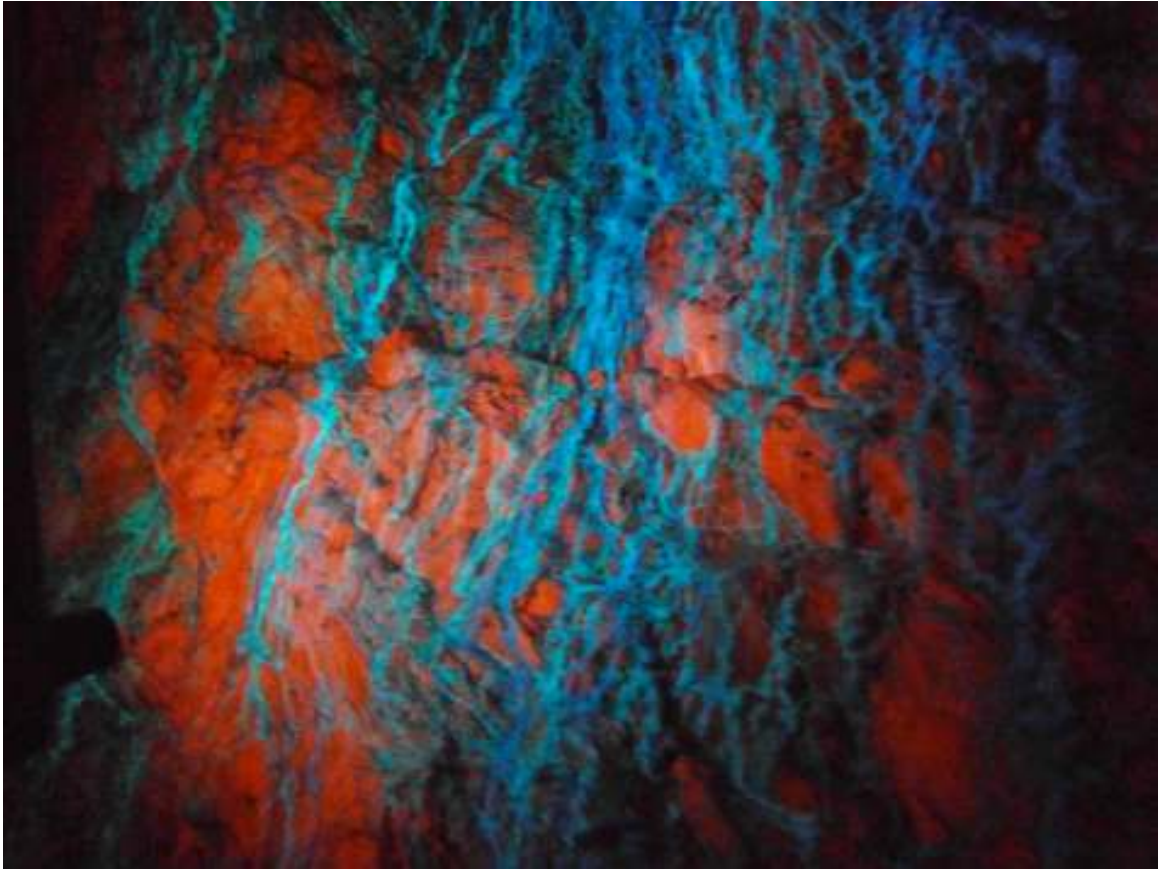

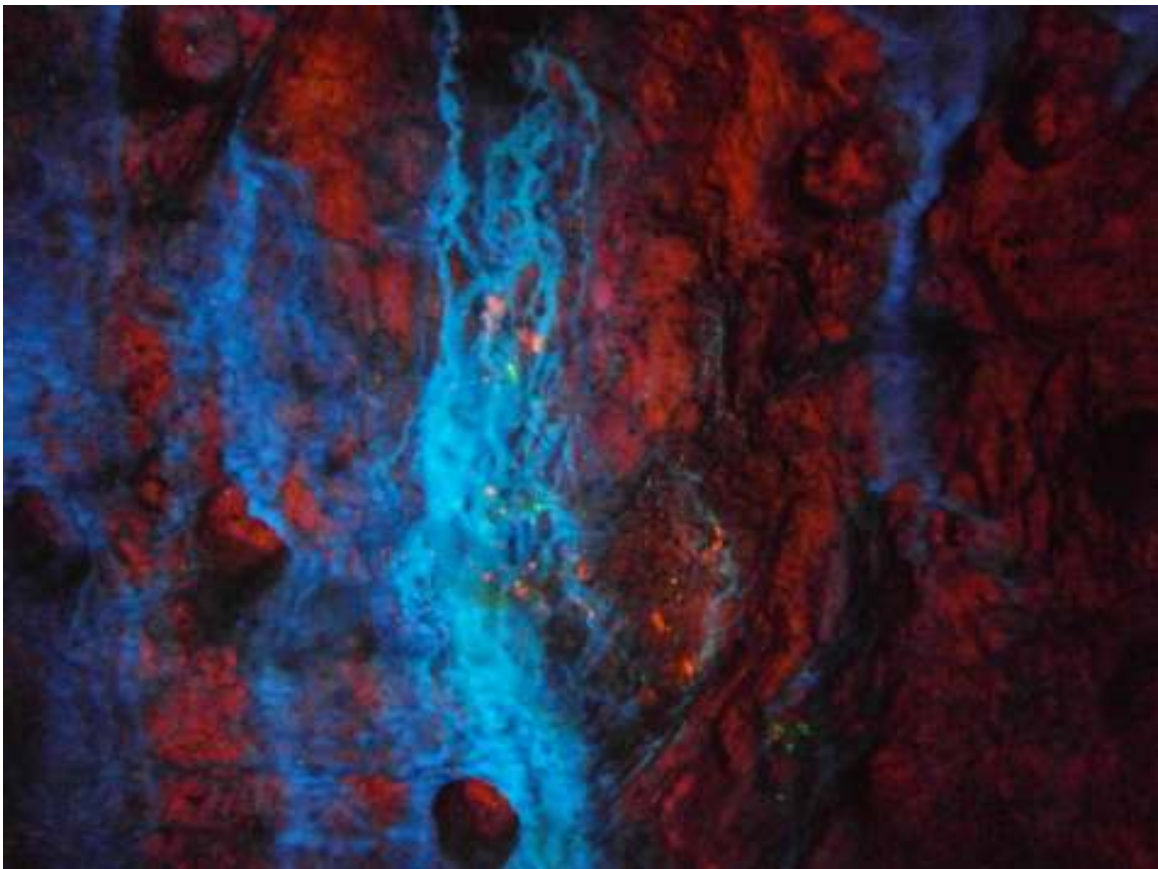

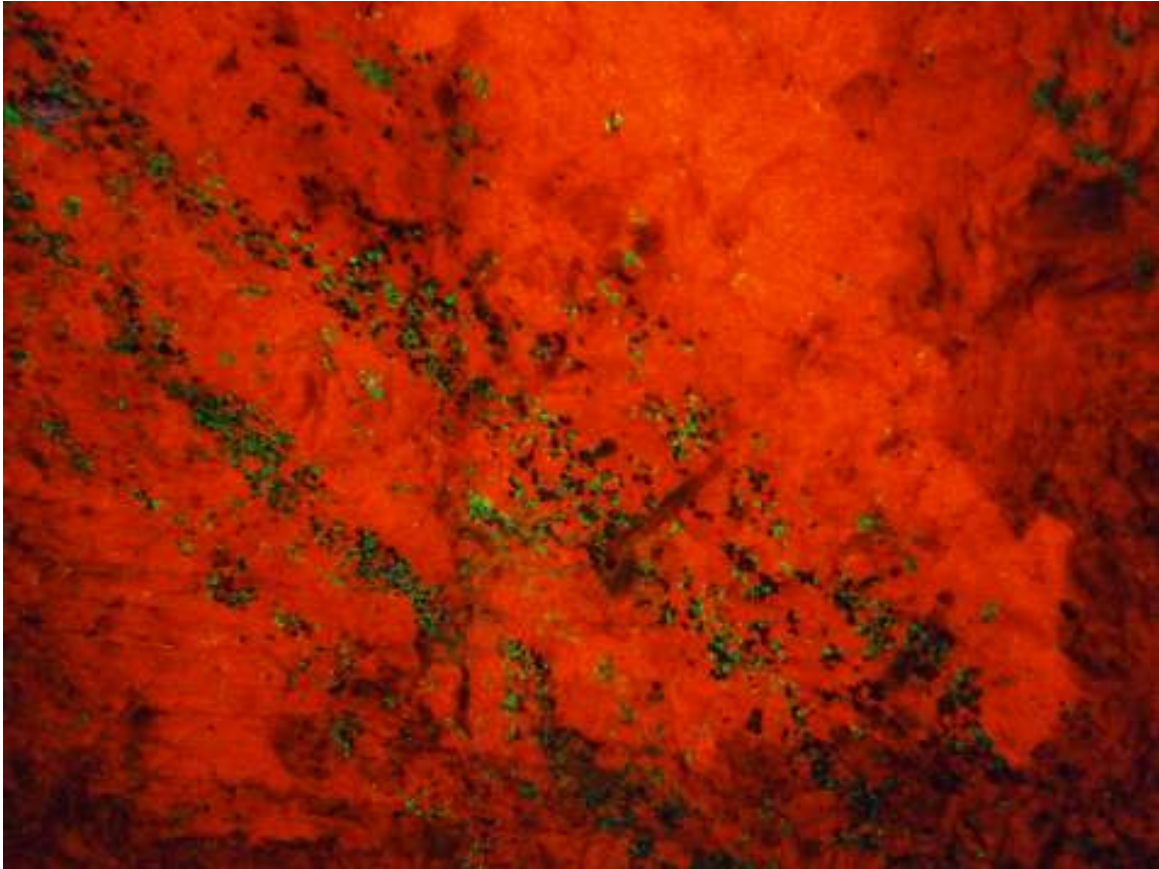

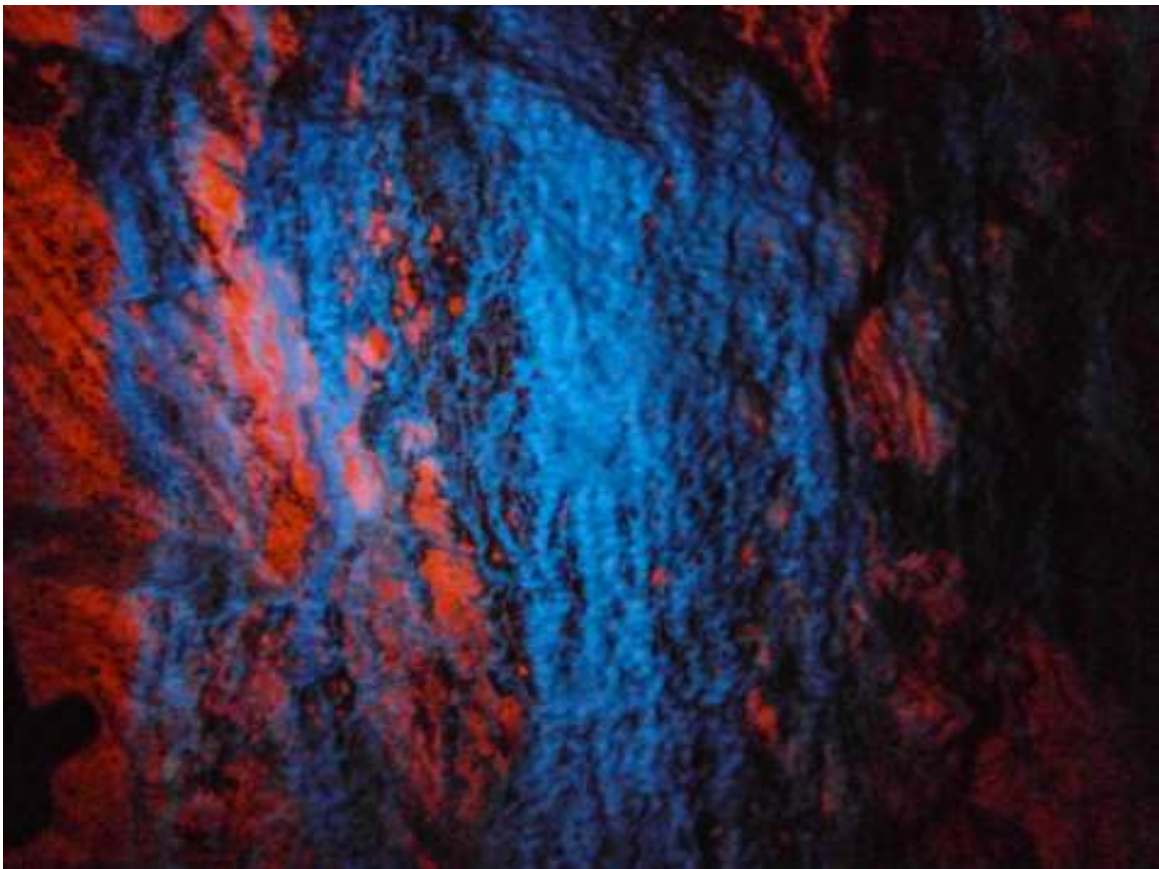

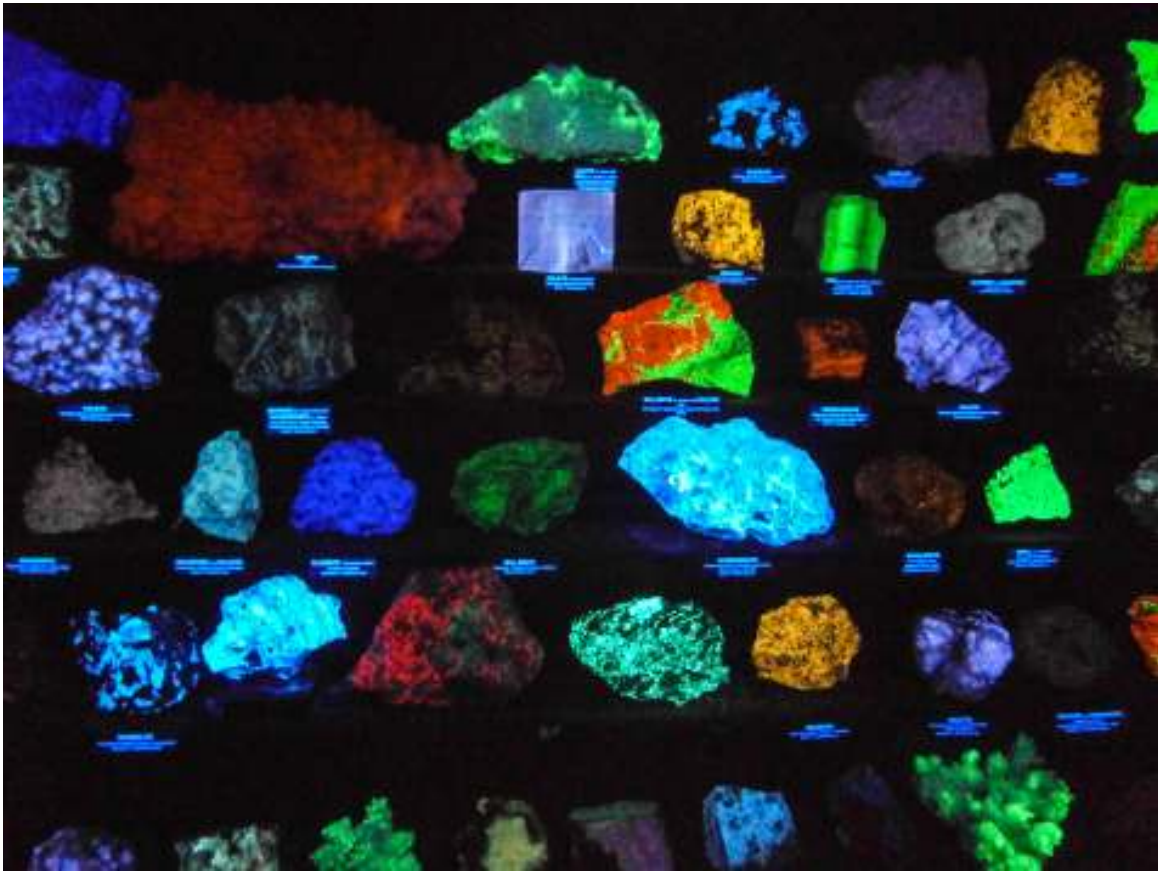
